Food Courts: There are many fast food restaurants located in the food courts in the basements of the downtown shopping centres. About \$ 8 for lunch.

You can enter the underground city at the corner of De Maisonneuve and Union. The Promenades de la Cathédrale shopping centre has a small food court, or you can walk underground to the Eaton Centre. You can then walk from the Eaton Centre underground to the Simons basement, passing through the Place Montreal Trust shopping centre, which also has a food court. If you want to keep going underground, from the Carrefour L'industrielle-Alliance you reach Les Cours Mont-Royal, and eventually surface at Peel St. If the weather is very bad, you can walk five blocks underground – your total distance travelled will be a good deal greater than if you stay on the surface.

Where to purchase maple syrup: On the weekend, there usually are farmers selling maple syrup, taffy (*tire* in French), maple butter (spreadable maple sugar) and maple sugar at stalls in the small park (Phillips Square) opposite the Bay department store on St. Catherine St at Union. If you have time, take the metro from McGill-College to Lionel-Groulx (4 stops) and walk along Atwater to the Atwater Market (about 10 minutes walk) where many farmers have stalls selling maple products. At the Atwater market you can also buy a range of cheeses, preserves, etc. both from the stalls and from the permanent stores inside. Do not buy maple syrup at gift shops, unless you are willing to pay a very large amount for the fancy bottle or tin. A 500 ml. tin should cost about \$7 at the Atwater market or in a supermarket. (The price varies a bit by grade of syrup.)
